For the best of country living, the house has two stone hearths—a large open one for cooking and a smaller one for heating. I have no doubt the hearths, along with the sandstone foundation, go back to the original 18th century structure.


Time did not allow for me to try napping on the rope bed. Maybe on the next tour. The inclusion of a handmade quilt is a very nice touch.

## Rescued Quilt Show at the Pittsburgh Center for Creative Reuse



In the April 2025 SHHS Newsletter, we featured an article about the quilt and mattress donated to the Neill Log House by SHHS member Agnes Poropatic (right, with Tony Indovina).

During the month of October, the Pittsburgh Center for Creative Reuse is presenting *Rescued Quilts*, a show of quilts found, revived, and completed by Agnes, a long-time quilter and Creative Reuse volunteer. A lifelong sewer, Agnes saves and then completes unfinished quilt



projects from Creative Reuse, thrift stores, and yard sales. She says, "Sometimes it requires just getting the quilts quilted, while other times it requires taking things apart and sewing them back together. All of the quilts in this show are rescued quilts and are for sale, with the proceeds going to Creative Reuse. If you donated an unfinished quilt, quilt top, or quilt blocks to Creative Reuse, you might see them finished here!"

The majority of the quilts were longarm quilted by Mary Bruinsma. Agnes will be in the gallery answering questions and providing guidance on unfinished quilt projects you may have.
